

Why gender is relevant in energy




Gender: men and women and their ROLES and responsibilities






Why gender & energy: The gender-energy nexus is central to Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)





Energy Access through Women's Economic Empowerment (WE) Programme: Value addition




Investing in women's economic empowerment sets a direct path towards gender equality, poverty eradication and inclusive economic development

- Create, advocate, promote best practices and linking this to policy and research



Some outcomes of the LCEDN-ENERGIA workshops

- 1. Partnerships are key
- 2. Need to build evidence, empirical as well as "anecdotal" evidence
- 3. Women can be change agents in the energy transition, but are more often than not boxed in as end users
- 4. Gender is not a subset of poverty
- 5. Government programme targeting women and the poor should also address intersectionality
- 6. Use of energy is crucial, and access does not imply use
